- If you see a bat that needs help, call Arizona Game and Fish (602-942-3000).
- When possible, use fewer pesticides around your home to protect bats from poisoning.
- Supervise pets if they go outside to keep both your furry friends and bats safe
- If you or anyone you know likes to explore caves, make sure it's done safely for both you and bats in the cave.
- Learn about bats! Talk to family and friends about why bats are awesome and important to our ecosystem.
