Crazy Cacti!

When you think about the Sonoran Desert, what comes to your mind? The hot sun, very little water, and, of course, cactus! There are close to 1,800 species of cacti around the world and the Sonoran Desert has about 300 of them--that means we are living in a region that contains 1/6 of all the cactus species on earth. That's pretty cool! Also, all cacti are succulents, but not all succulents are cacti. Hearing the word succulent, you might picture one of the popular plants that have smooth, thick leaves and are often some cool green or blue color. But succulents are actually a term used for a bunch of different plant families. It just means the plant is specially designed to store water, which is why cacti are so successful in the dry desert. Join us to learn more about two of the cacti that call the Sonoran Desert home.









Caring for a Cactus

Obviously, there are no hospitals out in the wild Sonoran Desert. But, did you know there are nurses out there? Well, nurse plants to be specific. These nurse plants have a similar job as the nurses who work in the maternity ward with babies. These are often shrub-like plants (creosote, ocotillo, and even young palo verde and mesquite trees) that provide protection for newly sprouting cactus seeds (and other types of plants, as well). The harsh desert environment can be tough on seedlings, so nurse plants provide some protection from the desert environment while the seedling grows into a more mature plant that can survive.

- McDowell Sonoran Preserve (free) (Scottsdale) Phoenix Preserve (free) (Phoenix)
- South Mountain Park and Preserve (free) (South Phoenix/Ahwatukee)
- <u>Usery Mountain Regional Park</u> (\$7 entrance fee) (Mesa/Apache Junction)
- White Tank Mountain Regional Park (\$7 entrance fee) (Waddell)
